Panoramic Liverpool

Take in the city's highlights including St Georges Hall, considered one of the finest neo-classical, buildings in Europe. The two majestic Cathedrals, one of which is the largest Anglican Cathedral in Europe. Albert Dock is a fascinating blend of history with a collection of superbly restored dockland buildings with award winning cafes, restaurants, shops and museums. Drive past the Town Hall and China Town as well as the Royal Liver Buildings, with its towers topped by liver birds. Continue through the city's suburbs and parklands to Penny Lane, to photograph the street sign immortalised by the Beatles. Cultural Liverpool

European Capital of Culture and UNESCO World Heritage Site, Liverpool is full to the brim with history, art, music and theatre. A RIBA walking tour of the city will bring to life the buildings and institutions that shaped Liverpool. In William Brown Street, you can't fail to be impressed by the stunning Grade I listed St George's Hall, the Central Library where amazing historical reading rooms meet a state-of-the-art 21st-century library or The Walker Art Gallery on this architecturally stunning street. Walk along the aptly named Hope Street next, to visit Liverpool Cathedral and the Metropolitan Cathedral - there is an array of fantastic places for lunch on Hope Street too. In the city centre, the Bluecoat Arts Centre is a 300-year-old building with a programme of visual art, literature, music and dance. End your walk in Albert Dock for Tate Liverpool and Maritime Museum, and then over to Museum of Liverpool, where you will see the majestic Three Graces directly alongside your ship.

A UNESCO World Heritage Site Maritime Mercantile City

Discover the maritime mercantile City of Liverpool's pivotal role as the gateway to the new world. The city played a key role in the growth of the British Empire and became the major port for the mass movement of people – over 9 million people emigrated to America via the Port of Liverpool. Six areas of the city bear witness to the development of one of the world's major trading centres in the 18th and 19th century. Liverpool was a pioneer in the development of modern dock technology, transport systems and port management and the WHS features a significant number of commercial, civic and public buildings. The Merseyside Maritime Museum, is the ideal location to explore and uncover Liverpool's historic seafaring past and the development of the world famous port. Ships, paintings, ship models, ship wrecked objects, uniforms and more, bring Liverpool's nautical history to life.

Liverpool's Historic Halls

Grade I-listed St George's Hall opened in 1854 and is one of the finest Neo-Classical buildings in the world with its magnificent 720sq metre Great Hall with chandeliers, stained glass windows, barrel vaulted ceiling and famous Willis organ. Liverpool Town Hall was constructed between 1749 and 1820 and is a Grade I listed, flagship building in the heart of the Castle Street conservation area of the city. It is one of the finest surviving 18th century Town Halls in the country and is often frequented by Royalty and visitors from around the world. National Trust, Speke Hall is a stunning example of a Tudor manor house with restored Victorian interiors. Situated in a most unusual setting, it is surrounded by attractive gardens protected by a collar of woodland. Constructed by a devout Catholic family, who were keen to impress visitors with their home's grandeur, this beautiful building has witnessed more than 400 years of turbulent history.

England's Golf Coast

Liverpool city region is a world-class destination for golf, home to 20 of the finest and most naturally beautiful golf courses in Britain, three of which are Royal Links courses. 'Royal Birkdale', set amid



spectacular sand dunes, is the number 1 golf course in Britain and will host the Open Championship in 2017. 'Royal Lytham & St Anne's' in Lancashire is one of the premier links courses in the world and Royal Lytham has played host to ten Open Championships and two Ryder Cups. 'Royal Liverpool' is the second oldest seaside links course in England, as well as home to one of the best collections of golf memorabilia outside St Andrews.

Charming Chester & Port Sunlight

Chester sparkles with a magical heritage, completely encircled by city walls with archaeological excavations have revealed a 2000 year-old Roman Amphitheatre - the largest stone-built arena of its kind in Britain. The 13th century 'Rows' are two tiers of enticing shops in black and white Tudor style. Chester Cathedral is a 13th Century Norman Cathedral and was the site of Handel's first public performance of "The Messiah" in 1742. The historic Port Sunlight Village houses a Museum showing the history of this workers' village, whilst the stunning collections and exhibitions at the Lady Lever Art Gallery are regarded as one of the finest art galleries in Europe with the best collection of Wedgwood Jasperware anywhere in the world. Afternoon refreshment at Port Sunlight Museum is a must.

Facilities

Cruise Terminal Building: There is a passenger lounge with comfortable seating, rest rooms, a small cafe and a Tourist Information desk with advisers who can assist with maps, advice, ticket sales, bookings etc, Welcome Desk.

Currency Exchange : Numerous outlets are located in the city centre which is just a 5 minute walk away / 0.3km

Internet Access: Wifi is available in Liverpool Cruise Terminal for a small donation to the Liverpool Seafarers Centre. Free Wifi is available in numerous cafés located close by.

Telephones: There is a public telephone box directly outside the Cruise Terminal building

Mailbox: Located just a 5 minute walk away at the Town Hall in the city centre

Taxi Rank: A Taxi rank is located directly outside Liverpool Cruise Terminal. Private Hire taxis can also be booked.

Distance to Railway Station : The nearest underground rail station is a 5 minute walk whilst the nearest National Rail station (Lime Street) is a 5 minute taxi ride.

Distance to Airport: Liverpool John Lennon airport is just 8km away from Liverpool Cruise Terminal and takes approx 30 minutes in a taxi.

Banks / ATM Machines: Located just a 5 minute walk away at the Town Hall in the city centre

Restaurant/Café: There are numerous bars, restaurants and cafes located directly adjacent to the cruise terminal with many more just a 5 minute walk away in city centre
